**McGavock Confederate Cemetery** on

the grounds of Carnton Plantation in Franklin, Tennessee. The Army of Tennessee swept through Carnton's grounds in 1864 on their way to attack the Union lines outside of 19th-century Franklin. The next day, the bodies of Patrick Cleburne, Hiram Granbury, John Adams and Otho Strahl, all Confederate generals, lay on the back porch of Carnton. The plantation house served as the largest Confederate hospital in the area. Blood stains are still evident on the floor of the bedrooms. The McGavock family, the owners of Carnton, set aside two acres a few hundred yards from the mansion as cemetery for almost 1,500 Confederate soldier remains. Work got underway in 1866 to raise money for the work. The graves are arranged by state. The Mississippi section contains 424 bodies; Tennessee 230; Missouri130; Alabama 129; Arkansas 104; Texas 89; Georgia 69; South Carolina 51; Louisiana 19; Kentucky 5; Florida 4, and North Carolina 2. There are 225 bodies interred in the Unknowns section. The mansion and grounds are now part of the Battle of Franklin Trust. This picture does not give the viewer a true idea of the sweeping nature of the long narrow cemetery that slowly slopes downhill towards the trees.

Wilder Brigade Monument or Wilder Tower on the Chickamauga battlefield. It honors the Lightning Brigade, let by Colonel John Wilder. The Brigade was armed with 7-shot Spencers and mounted on horses and mules.
