Jeff Zickefoose 1958-2021

Jeffrey Van Zickefoose, 62, Buckhannon, died Tuesday, April 27 at home. The WVRA extends its condolences to his wife Lynelle and to the families of his daughters Emily and April. He was an early member of the 1st West Virginia Infantry and West Virginia Reenactors Association. He was elected captain and led Company A of the 1st West Virginia Regiment of Volunteer Infantry for a few years before retiring slowly from the hobby. He served as captain during the years that 1st West Virginia reenacted as part of the Kanawha Battalion and in fact I received a couple of reminisces from his fellow company commanders in organization. Other reminisces can be seen in other parts of this publication.

We missed him many years ago in the hobby and now he is missed by all who knew him.

Event Reviews

School of the Longhunter

After a year's hiatus due to the pandemic, Pricketts Fort held its School of the Longhunter, which is largely a symposium on various aspects of life on the 18th century frontier. This year, due to ongoing restrictions, all aspects of the event were held outside of the visitors' center in and around the fort. Topics discussed included: Rendering Fat: How bear and deer fat is rendered to make usable grease; Shoe packs, which was a discussion of how to make and use such winter footwear:; Perspective on Colonial Frontier Horns (powder horns); Care and Cleaning of Your Flintlock and the life of frontiersman Sam Brady.

There was also a show and tell of "Bring an original 18th Century item from your collection." On Saturday evening there was an auction to benefit the fort and a church service was scheduled for Sunday morning.

Reminiscences Of Jeff

Probably the porta-john appropriate at this time. The other one I remember best occurred at New Market, when we were marching to the battlefield, past the sutlers, I believe. There were cars parked facing the road and the parking lot had been marked off with manilla twine tightly fastened to short stakes. As first corporal, I was marching directly behind Jeff who was commanding the unit. As he passed the end of the parking line, he hit the last stake with his foot, which caused the line to snap back and wrap around my ankles, some what like a bolo and dropping me flat on my face. In fact, I was so tied up that I couldn't get it off. The First just marched on past me (so much for no man left behind (a). Fortunately, the captain of the next regiment in the column pulled out his pen knife and rescued me. I don't think Jeff even knew it happened until I told him later. It was so bizarre and ridiculous, that I thought it was funny even when I was still on the ground. In his own humble way, Jeff just said that he was the unit Gumby.

From Jimmie Epling (former captain of the 91st OVI)

Jeff was the commander of the 1st WV when were participating in Civil War re-enactments as the Kanawha Battalion. Jeff and the 1st WV joined with the 91st OVI, sometimes falling in with us. Many of you will remember him at Droop Mountain, Rich Mountain, Cedar Creek and many other places.

Jeff was a terrific guy. One memory I have of Jeff is at Cedar Creek where we formed one company and he served as Lieutenant. As Captain, I had given all the orders for the company to fire, except one. I became a "casualty", taking all by surprise, including

Jeff. He quickly realized there was no "fire" command and took over the company. (a picture of Jimmie is located on the last place of this edition of the Dispatch.)

From David Cooper 83rd Pa.

At Buffington's Island one year our unit went as the 83rd Pa. It so happens there were not enough confederates so Jeff and others galvanized gray. I had my extra confederate uniforms to loan out and Jeff focused in on my officers uniform with all its braid and chicken guts. He was so proud of wearing it he wore it almost all day in camp. I remarked to him "He was the only many I know who could strut while sitting down." He was every bit an Officer and a gentleman and I am fortunate our paths crossed.

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think his clumsiness was somewhat exaggerated. We would give him a hard time about hayfoot, strawfoot. But when I became a company commander, I understood completely what he went through. One of the last reenactments we attended together he had relinquished command and he attended with April. He was a fine Christian gentleman who will be missed.

Wandering Through The Grave Yard

While strolling through Elkview Cemetery just off Route 50's Joyce Street Exit in Clarksburg, in search of the Civil War tombstones I passed this memorial marker in one of the Maxwell family plots (the Maxwells were a prominent and wealthy family in the first half of the 20th Century in Clarksburg.) After little research some help from living Maxwell family members I put together the following:



Porter Wilson Maxwell, Commander, US Navy killed in action at Shikoku, Japan, July 24, 1945. Commander Dive Bomber Group VB-87 flying off the USS Ticonderoga. Listed as missing in action USS Ticonderoga's cruise book. Distinguished Flying Cross and Silver Star. One source says he is not buried at this stone in Elkview Cemetery, but is buried at Grafton National Cemetery. A Maxwell family member tells me he was cremated by the Japanese and tells me his ashes are definitely buried at Elkview. In 1948 a single Hellcat appeared in the eastern sky and flying at tree-top level buzzed over the grave of Porter in the Elkview Cemetery and then passed over his parents' home on East Main Street. He returned for a second run, dipping his wing over the grave in salute and then roared away, the powerfully loud engine shaking everything around.

Porter Maxwell was born in Clarksburg in 1913, educated in Clarksburg public schools, including Washington Irving High School before graduating from the United State Naval Academy in 1936. He served on a number of ships including prestigious assignments to battleships and eventually he entered the air wing of the Navy.

In August of 1942, flying his Dauntless dive bomber off the *USS Wasp*, he participated in the bombing of Tulagi and many other actions associated with the preparation of the landings at Guadalcanal, the battle of Guadalcanal and the defense of the same. The *USS Wasp* was torpedoed while Maxwell was flying a mission and he had to land on the *USS Hornet*. Eventually he flew out of Henderson Field on Guadalcanal. All the while Maxwell served as XO and second in command to Squadron VS-71 eventually ascending to command after his commander was missing in action in November, 1942.

The squadron was deactivated soon after and Maxwell was returned to the States where he rotated to the Naval air stations in northern Florida to training naval air cadets. In October of 1944 Maxwell led about 40 planes out of Norfolk Naval Air Station away from an approaching hurricane to Benedum Airport outside of Bridgeport. The sound of the flight including a number of Hellcats with their roaring 2000-horsepower engines shaking houses to their foundations drew a lot of attention when they passed over Clarksburg. Maxwell returned to active service in January, 1945 on the USS Ticonderoga flying the powerful new Hellcat. By summer the squadron began the work of destroying Japanese naval assets in preparation for the invasion of Japan.

Porter was lost when his F6F-5 Hellcat was shot down near Kure, Japan, on July 24, 1945. He was commanding officer of Bombing Fighting Squadron (VBF) 87 from the decks of USS

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Ticonderoga (CV 14); he had taken command on January 2, 1945.

From an article on James Vernon, a pilot in Porter's squadron, in the <u>Ventura County Star</u> on August 6, 2008.

Much of the flying that group did involve trying to find the bases where kamikaze aircraft were hiding and put them out of commission before they attacked the American fleet. "Kamikazes killed about 10,000 American sailors," he said. "We tried to find them before they found us."

During one such mission, Vernon was wingman to the squadron leader, Cmdr. Porter Maxwell. They were not facing fighter plane opposition, but there was a great deal of antiaircraft fire from the Kure Naval Base, he said.

Flying south and then east of Hiroshima over Niihama Bay, Vernon said, "the skipper was on my left and all of a sudden, I noticed what looked like debris coming from his tail. It just seemed to fall apart."

Vernon recounts what happened next in his book, "The Hostile Sky":

"The skipper's canopy opened, he stood up, his parachute streamed out and jerked him clear of the plane. The Hellcat hit the water with the skipper a few feet to the right of it.

His parachute didn't blossom to check his fall; he plunged feet first into the murky shallow water and disappeared." Another member of the squadron described the attack "Now running a high-speed strafing attack

across the Niiahama airfield at Shikokku, Japan...AA fire...our skipper ...ran right into it. They had his range. The skipper lifts his plane gaining an altitude of 150 (now out over the water, the tail wing assembly is battered by hot burning enemy fire. The plane rolls to the right.").

House Bill 2174

The West Virginia House of Delegates passed House Bill 2174 which it would make it illegal to remove, relocate or change the plaque of any statues on public grounds without a first obtaining a permit from the state Historic Preservation Office. I am not sure if the Senate has considered HB 2174 as of March 30.

In reading through several news articles, it seems that this bill will also apply to the naming of schools, streets and other public entities. Discussion over the bill in the legislature was centered around Civil War monuments and memorials, especially Stonewall Jackson on the State Capitol grounds
